




Latinos LEAD

Latinos LEAD promotes more inclusive and effective nonprofit organizations by

preparing and recruiting Latinos for community leadership

San Jose, CA – Latinos hold barely 12% of the board positions that oversee the 104 nonprofit organizations, while they make up 27% of the Greater San Jose region's population, according to a ground-breaking study prepared by Latinos LEAD. This disparity in community leadership was the topic of discussion for a panel held December 6 at the Silicon Valley Capital Club in San Jose by the <u>Hispanic Foundation of Silicon</u> <u>Valley.</u> Panelists also discuss the challenges to and successful approaches for recruiting Latino board members. "The lack of Latinos in these crucial roles represents a glaring disconnect among organizations that claim to promote community and human development," said Ron Gonzales, President & CEO at the Foundation. "The Boards Count! findings point to the need for greater transparency and for serious action by these boards."

Latinos Rarely Seen in San Jose Nonprofit Boardrooms

proportionally the region's Latino population, but I think we can all agree that having one Latino board member-or none at all-is simply unacceptable." Boards Count! provides a baseline for the objective measurement of Latino board representation of nearly 2,000 nonprofit organizations in 19 U.S. cities. Latinos LEAD will continue to examine this group to report on progress in nonprofit governance inclusion.

Patrick Salazar, Executive Director of Latinos LEAD, explained, "This report challenges nonprofit organizations to assess whether their board recruiting practices include their constituents at all levels." Salazar added, "We don't propose that nonprofit boards reflect


